

## **Do Justice**

**Serve** one another, our community, and the world with humility and love, relying on the empowerment of the Holy Spirit to lead us in witnessing to the love of God in Jesus Christ.



For the fourth year, we continued our program rhythm with a **Mission Fair** in the fall and **Mission Matters** in the spring. The Mission Fair was held on a Sunday morning for the purpose of introducing and communicating each of our mission partners to the church. Mission Matters was held on a Saturday morning during which our mission partners provide a bite-sized, two-hour opportunity for the purpose of engaging with one of them, hoping to connect you more intimately with one of them.

For the third year in a row, we learned about needs in **Honduras** and commissioned not two, but 10 volunteers this year to join the efforts of Palmetto International Missions. We supported 10 families to replace stick and mud shacks with sturdy, sanitary cinderblock homes with concrete floors (part of the 40+ homes being built this year).

We have supported the Presbytery of the James, Montreat Conference Center, Blue

Ridge Area Food Bank, and Region Ten's annual Thanksgiving meal (delivering meals to Lynchburg as the Charlottesville location is closed). With additional gifts, we supported Palmetto International Missions (Honduras) and a family of eight from International Neighbors.

Our efforts with our local mission partners for 2022-23 have included but are not limited to:

**Abundant Life:** Nine of you joined during Mission Matters, working diligently on a landscaping project with UVA students; annual art auction fundraiser held at First Pres this year for the first time; supported partnerships with UVa Health for Prospect Community health days

**AIM:** Monthly deliveries for Secure Seniors program

**Georgia's Friends:** Supported the nine current residents; assisted with landscaping and garden clean up; supported a new community pantry

**Habitat:** Supported construction efforts for the first 49 Habitat homes in the new Southwood mixed-income community, with closings planned on 33 partner family homes in 2023 and a Dedication for Village One in August; supported a total of 143 Partner Families through its Pathways financial coaching program, helping to make dreams of homeownership possible

Haven: Continued our Soup Kitchen with a rotation of volunteer teams and organized chefs of First Pres

**International Neighbors:** Assisted in providing rides for the nearly 100 refugee children to attend summer day camps; contributed funds to enable 60 newcomers to receive professional driving lessons; helped to initiate refugees meeting monthly in small groups for mutual support, mental health, and education

**PACEM:** Provided shelter, beds, and meals for an average of 50 guests for four weeks this winter; more than 60 volunteers provided bedtime and morning snacks, assisted with set-up and break-down of the shelter area, participated in fellowship during evening shifts, and served meals; donated socks, coats, long johns, gloves, sweaters, and assorted clothing

Loaves & Fishes: Assisted with the 50% increase in the number of clients served; supported the new mobile kitchen project, demonstrating how donated food can be prepared; supported building renovations; received a gift from our Mission and Benevolence Endowment for their community outreach efforts.

In countless and active ways, First Pres continues to serve faithfully, obeying the command to love God by loving our neighbors, near and far.







## **Love Kindness**

**Nurture** our faith in Jesus Christ through education and fellowship, growing in wisdom, and deepening our relationship with God and one another.



Fellowship continues to be an important part of First Pres family life. We always enjoy talking, laughing, and, of course, eating.

The Congregational Life Team did a wonderful job of hosting our Epiphany brunch, the seasonal Sunday picnics, and Picnic on Park.

This year we resumed Kirk Night, a beloved First Pres tradition from years

ago. With the wonderful help of Chef Ray Strunk, Congregational Life hosted several Wednesday evenings of fun and fellowship.

Sunday morning Fellowship Time continued to be hosted by a different group every week, giving each group an opportunity to not only participate in this meaningful activity but to share about the work they do.



## **Family Ministry**

### **Sunday School**

Thanks to the help of more than 15 dedicated volunteers, we had four children's Sunday School classes with an average attendance of 27 children every Sunday. Each class has its own unique curriculum depending upon the developmental needs and interests of the students. In every class, the children learned Bible stories, sang songs, crafted, and had time to get to know one another and share about their weeks.

### Children's Activities


Prioritizing relationship building, the Children and Family Ministry Committee offered a variety of children's activities throughout the year. Children were invited to attend cooking classes and play dates. We had 25 children attend our Parents' Night Out "Under the Stars" event, and we had a fun-filled Vacation Bible School with about 50 children, including children from Abundant Life Ministries.

### **Family Activities**

FPC also offered opportunities for families to connect with one another. In the fall, families were invited to join us in Lovingston for a corn maze and pumpkin patch picking. We also had our Advent craft workshop to help families decorate for Advent and explore the season together. We ended the program year with an Easter egg hunt and a Pentecost parade.











## **Youth Ministry**

### **Sunday School**

In Sunday School, we focused on exploring how the Bible, an ancient text, still speaks to our daily lives. Moving through Genesis to Ruth, we wrestled with how God's people consistently turn away from God and mistreat one another. Together we considered what it means to be in a covenant relationship with God and how our faith impacts how we treat each other.

We also enjoyed Advent and Lent series led by Anita Brockette and Chris Dean. We marked these special liturgical seasons by exploring spiritual practices and reflecting on the lectionary texts. At the culmination of the year, the Sunday School class worked together to organize and write the liturgy for Youth Sunday.


### **Community Service**


FPC's youth enjoyed engaging in a variety of community service activities over the year. The Youth Ministry Committee aimed to provide youth with service opportunities at least once a month. Some of our activities included shopping for food for Loaves and Fishes, rolling utensils for Soup Kitchen, and preparing lunch for Habitat for Humanity builders.



### Youth Group

Youth group provides youth with an opportunity to build supportive relationships. From pool parties to lock-ins to bowling, our youth participated in a variety of on and off-site activities meant to encourage teamwork and team bonding. Most Sundays, we met for lunch on the Downtown mall and came back to the church for group activities and discussion. We also met weekly at Bodo's for early morning devotionals centered around how we love our neighbors and ourselves. Youth serving on the Youth Ministry Committee took on leadership roles to help select youth group activities and invite their peers to participate.







## **Adult Ministry**

This program year Adult Ministry sponsored three special offerings.

We kicked off the Sunday School program in September with Dr. Martien Halvorson-Taylor of the UVA Department of Religious Studies, who spoke to us on "Who Wrote the Bible—and Why on Earth Does It Matter?" We livestreamed her presentation to a great response. This led us to livestream selected Sunday School classes throughout the year.

In January, Adult Ministries offered a Contemplative Retreat Day at FPC led by Rev. Liz Forney. This was a restorative day of stillness in God, reflection, and prayer with opportunities to learn about the ancient practice of the Examen, listening for God in our everyday lives, and an exploration of group listening prayer.

In the fall we offered a discussion group on Sunday afternoons on *The Chosen*, the first multi-season series about the life of Christ.


The Sunday school hour continued to offer a wide variety of classes. These included Uncommon Decency: Christian Civility in an Uncivil World; an exploration of Brene Brown's best seller *The Gifts of Imperfection*; Faith and Family for parents of children and teens; Just War Theory and Theology; Awaiting the Already: An Advent Journey Through the Gospels; The Kings of Israel and Judah (The Good, The Bad, And The Ugly) Part I (Part II is coming in September); Scripture in the Headlines. We offered two classes in Lent -- Dietrich Bonhoeffer's Life Together and Sensing Lent: Six Views of the Meaning of Lent. We wrapped up the school year with two classes: Bizarre Wisdom: The Apocalyptic Voice in Ancient Israel, Early Christianity, and Modern America; and Grandparents and Spiritual Development. We finished the program year with a summer class on the Scripture of the Day with the pastors discussing the scripture they were preaching on that Sunday.






We continued to offer spiritual growth opportunities during the week both in-person and via Zoom. These included the Monday Morning Bible Study, the Brown Bag Bible Study, Lectio Divina, Weekly Women's Bible Study, and the return in April of the Men's Luncheon.

All these efforts were in service of our mission statement goals to provide an environment for: Learning opportunities; Nurturing experiences; Centering activities; and Engaging the world.







# Walk Humbly with God

Worship God faithfully and joyfully, prayerfully seeking God's direction for our lives.

All regular and special worship services were held in person and livestreamed, and the recordings of all services continued to be available online. For most of this year (starting in September 2022), worship was offered at 9:00 a.m. (music by Praise Team) and 11:00 a.m. (music by Sanctuary Choir and Handbell Ensemble) each Sunday.

Welcome and Worship continued to engage volunteers for service roles in support of weekly services (Officer of the Day, Ushers, Praise Team, Sanctuary Choir, Handbell Ensemble, Communion Preparers, etc.), and attendance remained steady. Plans were made (i.e., volunteers recruited and materials developed) to resume welcome bags for visitors in Fall 2023.

Hanging of the Greens in November allowed members of the congregation to participate in decorating the church for Advent and singing Christmas carols. Two Christmas Eve services were held: the 4:30 p.m. service was a family-friendly service with music led by the Praise Team, and the 8:00 p.m. service was the traditional Lessons & Carols service led by the Sanctuary Choir.




Additional worship services were held on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday. The Sanctuary Choir

and guest musicians presented two master works offered during worship services: *Ode on the Morning of Christ's Nativity* (text by John Milton set to music by H. Walford Davies) on Sunday, December 18, 2022, and Robert Schumann's *Mass in C Minor* on Sunday, April 30, 2023.











### **Music Ministry**

This year, the members of the Music Ministry continued their faithful service of using music in praise of God. Highlights were the presentation of two major works by the choir, Davie's *Ode on the Morning of Christ's Nativity*, and Schumann's *Mass in C minor*. The Praise Team revitalized their offerings with the addition of new songs and arrangements to their repertoire. The handbells presented two excellent concerts in the community at the Christmas season and participated regularly in worship. Music on Park Street concerts continued, being re-energized after the difficulties of COVID. In all, the many participants grew musically, and in their commitment to excellence in worship and outreach to the community.









